- Think back to what made you curious as a kid. What kinds of things made you light up as a learner?
- What learning experience do you remember most vividly from your own childhood? What's a field trip, project, or assignment that you'll never forget? What made the experience so thrilling?
- How might we create more opportunities for us the adults to indulge our own curiosity in front of kids?
- How might you make time for silence and reflection? Do you have habits or practices that help you block out the world's noise?
- What are some ways you might transform your learning spaces?

 How might you make your environments more inviting or more comfortable? (This could be as simple as changing the lighting or as intensive as renovating a room!)
- What's the most memorable way someone has shown you how much they care about you?
- Who were the listeners in your life? What made those listeners so approachable?
- Are there ways you make yourself available to others as a deep listener?
- What's the most difficult thing you've ever learned how to do? Why did you stick with it?
- How do you help the kids in your care "sample" different things?
